Next month brings us Yule Toy Tourney! Through the years and kingdoms I have lived in one thing has remained constant - the merriment and fierce pride of the holiday tournament, with every branch fighting to give the most to children in need. This is my first chance to participate in Atlantia's, and I'm already getting giddy.

This year's Yule Toy Tourney celebrates Brian Boru mac Cennitig, the High King of Ireland, in the year he was crowned. The year he was born, there were 150 kings of Ireland. Can you imagine 150 kings of South Carolina? It would be chaos. So how did he unite them all?

For starters, his big brother, Mathgamain, started the job for him! Mathgamain took control of the Munster region of Ireland, which takes up about 1/4 of the island, to the south. Mathgamain was never officially recognized as king of Munster, and had a lot of trouble with his supposed

territory. Then a Norse king, Ivar, made a grab for part of their lands, and alliances formed - Mathgamain fought and failed, fought and failed.... But Brian came to the rescue!

Brian not only dueled against and defeated Mathgamain's Irish rivals, but he routed Ivar's armies, slew Ivar, and left the Norse settlements to thrive, bringing trade through Ireland. # Documentation Notes for Grymsdale Chronicles

### **Background**

The Middle English language was the descendent from Old English and the vernacular was spoken and written during the time from about 1150 to 1500. Middle English developed following the Norman Conquest of England borrowing great numbers of words from the Norman French of the conquerors and eventually developed into modern English.

During the late fourteenth to the fifteenth century there was evidence of writers recording the history of tournaments, deeds of arms, and other events of that were found noteworthy. This is evidenced by the work of Jean Froissart. Froissart devoted his life to literature and is most known for his *Chronicles* in French that publicized chivalric feats and deeds of arms. The writings of Froissart also provide an important source of events that occurred during his era, particularly during the first half of the Hundred Years' War.

### History

The majority of writings in England would have been found written in Italian or Latin, which meant that the writings were only available to the wealthy educated class. In order to reach a wider populace and gain popularity, writings needed to be written in Middle English. It was due to *The Canterbury Tales* written by Geoffrey Chaucer around the late fourteenth century, that Middle English became a common language.

The writings in Middle English contain word forms very different from those in modern English and today's readers may not be able to understand the language of these works without study. However, some dialects of Middle English resemble modern English and the meaning of something written in them often can be understood.

#### Method

For the account of the deed I chose to write the story based on various excerpts of Froissart, but without a specific excerpt being used as a model. I chose to not write the story in French, but in Middle English as my persona would have done.

In order to maintain the ease of readability of both writings, I decided to not try and write the stories completely in Middle English. The writings do contain some facts that would make them historically inaccurate, such as fighting single sword in a deed of arms, therefore some leeway is requested, since the deed the writing about concerns a modern day SCA contest of arms.

Froissart's writings composed his Chronicles into four books and when read; a modern convention was applied to indicate the book and chapter that excerpts are from. I decided to follow this convention and number this piece as the fourth in a book and in addition to prior writings I have done.

Following the tradition of scholars, I decided to include a copy of the account written in Modern English instead of a glossary, so that it could be used as a reference for those words that might not be able to be inferred from the reading.

### **Observations**

This is my fourth attempt to write accounts of tournaments and deed of arms in a period style in line with my persona. Although Middle English, French, and Latin are not languages in which I am knowledgeable, as I continue my study of period tournament accounts, I will develop my ability to write more tournament accounts in a structure that mimics the original writings more closely.

# The Song of Polyphemus

"Galatea, whiter than the snowy privet petals, taller than slim alder, more flowery than the meadows, friskier than a tender kid, more radiant than crystal, smoother than the shells, polished, by the endless tides; more welcome than the summer shade, or the sun in winter, showier than the tall plane-tree, fleeter than the hind; more than ice sparkling, sweeter than grapes ripening, softer than the swan's-down, or the milk when curdled, lovelier, if you did not flee, than a watered garden.

Galatea, likewise, wilder than an untamed heifer, harder than an ancient oak, trickier than the sea; tougher than the willow-twigs, or the white vine branches, firmer than these cliffs, more turbulent than a river, vainer than the vaunted peacock, fiercer than the fire; more truculent than a pregnant bear, pricklier than thistles, deafer than the waters, crueller than a trodden snake; oh, what I wish I could alter in you, most of all, is this: that you are swifter than the deer, driven by loud barking, swifter even than the winds, and the passing breeze."

The Metamorphoses is a Latin narrative poem by the Roman poet Ovid publish in 8 AD (761 AUC), considered his magnum opus. Comprising fifteen books and over 250 myths, the poem chronicles the history of the world from its creation to the deification of Julius Caesar within a loose mythico-historical framework.

Although meeting the criteria for an epic, the poem defies simple genre classification by its use of varying themes and tones. Ovid took inspiration from the genre of metamorphosis poetry, and some of the Metamorphoses derives from earlier treatment of the same myths; however, he diverged significantly from all of his models.

One of the most influential works in Western culture, the Metamorphoses has inspired such authors as Dante Alighieri, Giovanni Boccaccio, Geoffrey Chaucer, and William Shakespeare. Numerous episodes from the poem have been depicted in acclaimed works of sculpture, painting, and music. Although interest in Ovid faded after the Renaissance, there was a resurgence of attention to his work towards the end of the 20th century. Today the Metamorphoses continues to inspire and be retold through various media. The work has been the subject of numerous translations into English, the first by William Caxton in 1480.
