## From the Seneschal's Pen

As I write this, I'm almost finished packing to go to Pennsic. By the time you read it, though, I'll likely be on my way home again. A miniature anachronism, perhaps. Or maybe a temporal displacement.

It's easy to feel displaced in such a situation. It's even easier to feel out of place when you're in an unfamiliar setting, such as the first time you were at an SCA event. All these people dressed in odd clothing, wearing apparently important jewelry, hitting each other with sticks (and no one seems to protest), doing or talking about things that aren't common to the 21st century USA. Who wouldn't feel out of place??

Think back (for some of you that may be WAY back) to your own first event. Did someone notice that you were new? Come up to you and offer to introduce you to people who already were doing the kinds of things you'd expressed an interest in? Did anyone explain what you were seeing (the combat; behaviors in Court or around certain people)? Or were you left to fend for yourself and, with any luck, figured it out by yourself?

If they did help you - Excellent! If not, we let you down. It's with good reason that most chapters have a Chatelaine: a person responsible for the care and well-being of newcomers and guests. Dear Delía,

I've seen dogs at events: Should I bring mine? How should I prepare my puppy for camping?

Dear Lady Havoc,

First and foremost, you should make sure that the event allows pets. Many sites do not (with the exception of service animals). Next, apply common sense. Does your dog have trouble getting along with people and/or other pets? Is your dog terrified of loud noises, crowds, or unfamiliar situations? Is your dog in heat? If you answered yes to any of these questions you may want to reconsider bringing them until the issue/issues can be brought under control. And yes, I have seen people bring their pets despite these problems. Bottom line- ask yourself "Will my pet and the people and animals that come into contact with my pet be safe?" You also don't want your dog to be miserable. You don't want every hound dog in the neighborhood hanging out in your camp either.

Before you camp with your pet test the waters with a day-trip and see how it goes. If that goes well you should be ready. It is important for your pet be attended by a responsible person at all times, especially while camping. Don't just leave your pet tied to a tree while you attend court, fight, or go to a class. I myself was guilty of this many, many years ago. Elphin and I brought our little dog Pippin to an event and left him tied to a tree for about an hour. I came back to find Pippin trying to eat a ham as big as his head before the very angry woman it belonged to could snatch it back. A toddler had given it to him. That wasn't the only trouble he got into, despite the fact that I didn't leave him alone again. He also drank Ivar's beer and jumped so enthusiastically into the face of a man that was playing with him that I fear he broke the man's nose with his very hard head. ## Tasting from the Wooden Spoon....

Summer is upon us and so is the season I call "Pennsic War prep". I have yet to attend Pennsic, and I've been in the SCA for over 25 years, but it is still when most of my friends will be "crusading to Mecca" to spend at least a week at the SCA's largest and most iconic war. Right now, we can only go to one war a year; so we go to War of the Wings. There is still a lot to do to prepare for war – making a meal plan, allergies, shopping, determining how much can be made ahead, how many people are you expecting to drop by your camp, how many times you plan to eat out or have "no-cook" meals, if you plan on making a couple dishes for the baronial or kingdom hospitality, competition, trade, snacks, or just a few tidbits for your own hospitality table.

This is just one of my favorite recipes for the hospitality table, mainly because I can use the syrup to make Sekanjabin. I used an adapted recipe, exchanging "modern" spices for "medieval" ones. I have yet to find actual documentation.

#### Ingredients:

2 cinnamon sticks 8-10 whole cloves 2 ¾ cups packed light brown sugar 1 ¾ cups white wine vinegar 14-16 small tangerines (or 4 ½ pounds of kumquats) 1 tsp. blade mace 1 Tbsp. mixed pepper berries (long pepper would be nice) ½ tsp. baking soda Water

Wash the fruit. If using tangerines, prick the skin several times with a fork; if using kumquats, make a small horizontal slit in the top of each kumquat (over the stem end), no more than one-fourth-inch deep. This will allow the marinade to permeate the entire fruit. Place in a large pot and fill with water until just covered, add the baking soda, stir to dissolve. Bring to a boil and simmer for 15 minutes. Add the spices and vinegar, simmer for 20 minutes. Add the sugar and simmer covered for 20 minutes. Remove the fruit to clean, hot jars and continue to boil the liquid for 20 more minutes, or until slightly thicker (about 200°F if you're reading it on a thermometer). Strain and pour over fruit, leaving ½-inch headroom. Cool and keep in the refrigerator for a couple of months and use the syrup in Sekanjabin (recipe follows), or process in a boiling water bath for 15 minutes.

To make Sekanjabin – Pour a couple tablespoons of the syrup in a tall glass, add ice, and fill with water. Stir. You may wish it stronger or not as strong, so adjust accordingly.

Information about Sekanjabin is from Cariadoc's Miscellany where he mentions in this note: "This is the only recipe in the Miscellany that is based on a modern source: A Book of Middle Eastern Food, by Claudia Roden. Sekanjabin is a period drink; it is mentioned in the Fihrist of al-Nadim, which was written in the tenth century. The only period recipe I have found for it (in the Andalusian cookbook) is called "Sekanjabin Simple" and omits the mint. IT is one of the large variety of similar drinks described in that cookbook-flavored syrups intended to be diluted in either hot or cold water before drinking." I am researching the spiced tangerine recipe.
