### From the Seneschal's Pen

Happy 37th birthday, Nottinghill Coill! Even though January 12, 1980 is our official birthday as a barony, our origins go back further than that, in fact - all the way back to the summer of 1974. So, here's a brief history lesson. (With many thanks to our founding baron, Master Gavin Reynes, for much of this history. Any errors in understanding or transcription are mine.)

- -- Summer 1974: Gavin started looking into the SCA, which itself was only 8 years old.
- -- Spring 1976: The SCA's Curia Regis (held in the East Kingdom, in Boston) approved formation of a shire that would encompass all of South Carolina. Gavin was named the Seneschal for this chapter (by the then-Seneschal of the East Kingdom: William de Montegilt, who to this day still is active in the SCA, in the Kingdom of Aethelmearc). At this time, Gavin had attended only one (1!) event. Note: Atlantia was not yet a kingdom nor even a principality. That happened about two months later.

- -- 1977: Megara di Alessandra met Gavin at the Tourney of Ymir (only the second year that this event had been held.) She was enthusiastic, and went on to found the Canton of Tear-Sea's Shore.
- -- January 21, 1978: The first event was held in South Carolina. It was attended by the Prince and Princess of the then-Principality of Atlantia: Laeghaire O Laverty and Ysabeau Cameron.
- -- There was significant growth in the area after this. Shortly after, Tear-Sea's Shore held their first event. Richard Mowbray (who eventually became Syr Richard de Montbrai, and our third Baron) wrote to express interest, and went along to that Shore event. On his return, he started what became the Canton of Falcon Cree.
- -- Giles of Griffin Hill formed a group that encompassed Camden, Columbia, and Saluda. This became the Canton of Cyddlan Downs.
- -- The Canton of Fnaedhom was formed in the Clinton SC area.
- -- Hidden Mountain formed as a chapter within Nottinghill Coill. Subsequently, it separated from Nottinghill Coill (not yet a barony) and became an entity of its own.
- -- Nottinghill Coill now had grown sufficiently in numbers and activity, and petitioned to become a barony.
- -- 1979: The Canton of St. Michael's Keep (Georgetown and Murrell's Inlet, SC) formed shortly before Nottinghill Coill's petition was granted.
- -- January 12, 1980, AS XIV: At Principality Twelfth Night, Nottinghill Coill was granted the status of a Barony! Gavin Reynes was chosen to become Baron Gavin, the first of our barony. Our first baronial champions were chosen by combat.
- -- The Shire of Hidden Mountain and Tear-Sea's Shore went together to become (four years later) a separate barony: the Barony of Hidden Mountain.
- -- January 17, 1981: At our first Baronial Birthday event, the first three baronial awards came into being: the Coill's Tripaliere ("hard worker", for Service) now known as the Order of the Gordian Knot; the Coill's Muse (for the Arts & Sciences); and the Coill's Champions (for Martial activities.)
- -- March 26, 1983: Baron Gavin held his last Court and was succeeded by Baron Dressel of Seven Bends and Baroness Genevieve of Nottinghill.

And where, pray tell, did our name come from? Well, 'Nottinghill' obviously refers to hills, and 'Coill' (pronounced Quill, not Coil) is an old English word for a forest. The two together were meant to be descriptive of the geography of our region: hills and forests.

In the 37 years since our start as a barony, there have been only 13 barons and baronesses guiding our lands, of whom now-Master Gavin was the first and Baron Lucien and Baroness Brig are the most recent. Vivant to them and all the ones in between for their examples and leadership that have brought us this far. May we have many more productive and satisfying years yet to come!

# Tastings from the Wooden Spoon...

Long Pepper (Piper longum)

I am giddy on my latest acquisition from The San Francisco Spice Company: long pepper. This spice is practically unknown in the modern pantry; but, in ancient times, it was considered a superior spice to the Tellicherry and Malabar black pepper (Piper negrum/negra). This spice was used in Southeast Asia all the way to Greece, Rome, and Northern Africa in the Ancient Times, and all over Europe in the Medieval Era. It is mentioned in the Ayuvedic Texts of India as well the writings of Pilny the Elder, and in the 15<sup>th</sup> century Boke of Nuture (c.1460) by John Russell where he provides a verse recipe for hippocras in which he states that:

"Good son, to make ypocras, hit were great lernynge, and for to take the spice thereto aftur the proporcionynge, Gynger, Synamome, Graynis, Sugur, Turnesole (that is good colourynge); for commyn peple Gynger, Canelle, longe pepur, hony after claryfiynge."

The ingredient list, translated roughly into modern English is: Ginger, Cinnamon, Grains of Paradise, Sugar, Heliotrope (for coloring). This was for the rich, for the "common person", it is Ginger, Canelle (what we call 'cinnamon' but is actually cassia), long pepper, and clarified honey; both recipes seeped in (strong red) wine. An earlier version is found in Curye on Inglysch. A prescription for 'Lord's Claret' (Potus Clarreti pro Domino), the wine is to be spiced with cinnamon, ginger, pepper, long pepper, grains of paradise, cloves, galingale, caraway, mace, nutmeg, coriander, brandy and honey.

Long pepper is pungent, like its cousin, but with a more complex flavor profile, with floral and citrus notes. If you have the opportunity to taste this unique spice, I'm certain you would wish this in your own spice cabinet. It pairs well with savory spices (like cinnamon and ginger), and is a treat on pork and chicken. Many recipes for "Powder Fort" includes long pepper as well as galangal and grains of paradise; so, anything you would season with the "standard" black pepper, you can season with the long pepper.

Documentation / Explanation (Razo):

The subject is the same, too (the almost-refrain of "Kiss me love, and let us share" is modified from Marlowe's "Come live with me, and be my love"): a male shepherd (or at least a pastoral shepherd-like narrator) is entreating his country love to spend more time with him. I was afraid of being even more of a ripoff by mentioning a nature-built gown (like Marlowe does) so I settled on ambrosia, nectar, and a flower-crown - nothing too original, but it's a pastoral; there's only so many images you can work with. This poem is different from the others in that it was not written originally for the Queen with the Campionesque songs, but I thought it would be a nice, gentle image of love - after all, this is the Neoplatonic will section of the book, the enacting of the idea and memory of love through a rational means - with which to end the book.

- Creating a "best practices" for the Kingdom and local websites. This is not to prevent the use of other solutions, but rather to provide a common direction and guidance on getting the most out of available community resources. Among these items are:
  - Use of a content management system based around Joomla! PHP,
     MySQL and WAMP.
  - · Bringing most, if not all of the Kingdom websites into a common system with some standardized controls and the ability to move easily from site to site.
  - · Changing static content to dynamic.
- Creating an E-mail group for the Webministers, to facilitate disseminating information and to provide a place for relevant discussion.
- Working to create a photo and model release database.

Mundane Name: David (yes, a common mundane name locally) Slice

Mundane occupation: Electronic Technician (Basically Road Worker on the Information Superhighway)

Tell us about your experience with the SCA: 7th Level Rapier Fighter, 12th Level Rapier Marshal, 2nd Level Exchequer

When did you first hear about the SCA? Very first was a college friend in 1987 who told me wrongly that the closest local group was in Greenville, SC. Then met this crazy guy wearing armor at a Halloween party that turned out to be Danny Hanson, AKA Master Vortigern.

What/who brought you into it? My burning desire to learn to kill people with a sword. Modern Fencing turned out to be unsatisfactory for me, but that led to meeting people who were in the SCA who did a demo at a fencing event.

What was your first event, and what was your first impression? My first event was a local Feast of St. Dismas in 1988. It was great, people were fighting, shooting bows at targets, cool medieval music was played, it was a whirlwind of awesome.

What do you love the most about the SCA? Camaraderie with my fellow nerds, history, sword fighting and role playing; there are so many people in the SCA who share my passions for these topics and more.

What has been your most memorable moment thus far? There are so many incredible memories it is quite impossible for me to choose. If pressed I think my best memory is from a few years ago, fighting on the battlements at the Siege of Rochelle at Pennsic. Me and a guy I never seen before nor since teamed up to very successfully clean out the battlements on the walls of the castle at Pennsic. Intense fighting in a picturesque setting. Rarely am I that "in the zone," every move was perfect, every attack lead to a kill or an opening for my partner to finish our opponents off.

How many years have you been in the SCA? It's been 28 years total, but there have been small gaps. The needs of the mundane life kept me from attending as many events or participating as fully as I would sometimes like.

What is your favorite SCA event activity to participate in? Hands down, Rapier. That initial passion (fighting with a sword) lead to a brief stint with armored fighting but I found I had little talent for it. Winning the rapier tourney the day I first authorized in 1993 cemented my love of the fighting form.

Have you held any offices or positions within the Barony? Rapier Marshal.

Were you voluntold or did you come down with a case of helium hand? I quickly realized that for the style of fighting I loved happened to require Marshals. And in the early to mid '90's there were very, very few rapier marshals making it to Southern events so I stepped up to fill in that gap.

Have you received any awards, and if so, which would you say is your favorite or means the most to you? I have received many awards, but hands down the one that means the most is the Order of the White Scarf. I was uncertain at first if this award was a good fit for me, but have found that, while wearing the white scarf on my arm makes me a target, the respect that comes with that attention is both humbling and gratifying.

When did you first become interested in rapier fighting? I cannot tell you the exact day, but I can tell you the exact moment; When I was a kid watching the dramatic fight in Errol Flynn's Robin Hood between Robin and the Sheriff. I saw that and said, "Wow, I want to be able to fight like that one day."

How many Kingdoms and Baronies have you lived in? While I have moved around within Nottinghill Coill, I have never moved out of the barony, much less Atlantia.

**Newcomer advice/guidance?** Find your passion. Don't do activities for the awards or accolades. In the end, those mean little compared to the joy of fulfilling your own dream. Be it archery, illumination, fighting, cooking or even just in service to others, find out what you want to do and follow it.

What is something you don't mind sharing that people may not know about you? When it comes to rapier or fighting in general, I have the natural talent of a turnip. What has made me good is untold hours of drilling and practice. Some of you might think I am downplaying my abilities, but trust me, I am not.

Tell us a bit about your Middle-aged self: There are two Elphins. Early period Elphin is a minor Celtic noble from what will later be called Wales. Very little is known of early period Elphin except he travels a lot. Late Period Elphin is the by-blow of a powerful Welsh Earl who was brought to Elizabeth's court at a young age. He left formal court life under a cloud and took up with some wandering gypsies. He makes his living as a wandering teacher of fence and occasionally cashes in tournament

prizes at fairs and other noble gatherings. He indulges in this upstart playwright's work, the Shakespur guy; his plays tend to be amusing and occasionally thought-provoking.

What is your SCA Name? Elphin ap Dafydd.

How did you pick your name? Literally out of a book of names with likely early period roots. Back in the ancient of days before this whole Interwebs thing, we had to take time off from hunting dinosaurs and making dirt to look up things in physical books that had been gathered in buildings called 'Libraries'. It was a likely seeming name with an ancient pedigree. Supposedly Merlin's grandfather was an Elphin and Elphin is also listed in the Irish Book of Kings.

What is your SCA device? A red lion lying down facing right on a golden field, the shield edged in red flames.

How did you pick your device? Part vanity and part elimination. I am somewhat lazy and have nice mane of hair so a lion seems a natural choice and I think red and gold look very smart. From there it was a matter of finding something that would work with college of heralds that wasn't already taken. (It is purely coincidence that it goes so nicely with Delia's device...)

Describe your persona: Elphin is me but more so. Less shy, more brash.

Why did you pick that persona? I am of Scots/Irish ancestry on my mother's side so Celtic was an interesting choice. Back in my early days in the SCA, it seemed every other person was a Scottish persona so being a Scot had little appeal. And I always loved Andre Norton's Witch World series that was loosely set in Welsh-based society so I went down that road.

**Do you have any titles?** Both my personas are a little uncomfortable with their "noble" backgrounds, but if pressed, Elphin will admit to the title of "Lord."
