From the Seneschal's Pen

Right now, the kingdom is in its annual lull period: either folks are away at Pennsic or there are few in-kingdom events going on. But as soon as the Pennsic pilgrims return, event activity will pick up again, along with the possibility of new people coming to check us out or (fingers crossed) to join us. With that in mind, I decided to reprise much of last year's August column from The Quill. It still has a lot of validity.

As I write this, I'm almost finished packing to go to Pennsic. By the time you read it, though, I'll likely be on my way home again. A miniature anachronism, perhaps. Or maybe a temporal displacement.

It's easy to feel displaced in such a situation. It's even easier to feel out of place when you're in an unfamiliar setting, such as the first time you were at an SCA event. All these people dressed in odd clothing, wearing apparently important jewelry, hitting each other with sticks (and no one seems to protest), doing or talking about things that aren't common to the 21st century U.S.A. Who wouldn't feel out of place??

Think back (for some of you that may be WAY back) to your own first event. Did someone notice that you were new? Come up to you and offer to introduce you to people who already were doing the kinds of things in which you'd expressed an interest? Did anyone explain what you were seeing (the combat; behaviors in Court or around certain people)? Or were you left to fend for yourself and, with any luck, figure it out by yourself?

If they did help you - Excellent! If not, we let you down. It's with good reason that most chapters have a Chatelain: a person responsible for the care and well-being of newcomers and guests. But that one person can't be everywhere and do everything for our newcomers. That is why it's often said

The SCA Harassment and Bullying Policy From the Society Seneschals Handbook:

XXIV. SOCIETY SENESCHAL POLICIES & INTERPRETATIONS

4. Harassment and Bullying

The SCA prohibits harassment and bullying of all individuals and groups. Harassment and bullying includes, but is not limited to the following:

- offensive or lewd verbal comments directed to an individual;
- the display of explicit images (drawn or photographic) depicting an individual in an inappropriate manner;
- photographing or recording individuals inappropriately to abuse or harass the individual;
- inappropriate physical contact; unwelcome sexual attention; or retaliation for reporting harassment and/or bullying.

Participants violating these rules are subject to appropriate sanctions. If an individual feels subjected to harassment, bullying or retaliation, they should contact a seneschal, President of the SCA, or the Kingdom's Board Ombudsman. If a participant of the SCA becomes aware that someone is being harassed or bullied, they have a responsibility pursuant to the SCA Code of Conduct to come forward and report this behavior to a seneschal, President of the SCA or Kingdom's Board Ombudsman.

The following statement must be posted at gate/troll at every SCA event in a size large enough for people to see it as they enter our events. This language must likewise be quoted in ALL site handouts at every event a site where a handout is made available.

THE SCA PROHIBITS HARASSMENT AND BULLYING OF ALL INDIVIDUALS AND GROUPS.

Participants engaging in this behavior are subject to appropriate sanctions. If you are subjected to harassment, bullying or retaliation, or if you become aware of anyone being harassed or bullied, contact a seneschal, President of the SCA, or your Kingdom's Board Ombudsman.

Tastings from the Wooden Spoon...

Humble Pie

Actually, Nombuls. Nombuls is Old French for "from the loins". It sounds like "umbles" and has been bastardized to "humble" - the English word for "lowly". So, it is a misnomer that the innards of a beast were considered "humble fare", but there is a recipe in 'Liber Cure Cocorum', 1430 (Liber Cure 1430) that would repute that.

Nombuls.

Take tho hert and tho mydruv and the kydnere,

And hew hom smalle, as I the lere; Presse oute the blode, wasshe hom thou schalle,

Sethe hom in water and in gode ale; Coloure hit with brende bred or with blode;

Fors hit with peper and canel gode, Sett hit to tho fyre, as I the telle in tale;



This recipe is for the kidneys of the hart or deer. In the Middle Ages, the innards were considered just another meat – one that needed to be cooked first and was considered prize pieces, especially tripe, sweetbreads, fois gras, and other inner parts, as they were the most tender and flavorful.

Here is another one, from Du Fait de Cuisine from E. Cook {tran}:

61. For the chopped liver: he who has the charge of the chopped liver should take kids' livers - and if there are not enough of those of kids use those of veal-and clean and wash them very well, then put them to cook well and properly; and, being cooked, let him take them out onto fair and clean boards and, being drained, chop them very fine and, being well chopped, let him arrange that he has fair lard well and properly melted in fair and clean frying pans, then put the said chopped liver in to fry and sauté it well and properly. And then arrange that he has a great deal of eggs and break them into fair dishes and beat them all together; and put in spices, that is white ginger, grains of paradise, saffron, and salt in good proportion, then put all of this gently into the said frying pans with the said liver which is being fried while continually stirring and mixing with a good spoon in the pans until it is well cooked and dried out and beginning to brown. And then when this comes to the sideboard arrange the aforesaid heads on fair serving dishes, and on each dish next to the heads put and arrange the aforesaid chopped liver.

As you can guess, it's essentially liver and eggs.

The head was also considered prize for the tender parts like the tongue, cheeks, and brain; for that matter, the head is even nowadays considered prized in several cultures – like in Spain and Mongolia. In Japan, the whole tuna head is roasted for a special delicacy.

I have a recipe I recently shared for beef (heart) and kidney pie. I can say that it is "medieval-ish", as it's based off the English beef (steak) and kidney pie:

- So a couple pounds of kidneys, cleaned of viscera and sliced thin, soaked in about 2 cups milk
- S a 2-pound beef heart, sliced thin
- § 1 large onion, chopped

- \$ 2 carrots, chopped
- S 1 rib celery. chopped
- So salt. pepper and herbs and spices to taste
- S a few dashes of Worcestershire sauce
- So oil and butter, a couple Tbsps.
- S about a 4c flour
- \$ 2 shortcrust (pie crusts), recipe follows

Preheat oven to 350°F. Sauté onions, carrots, and celery in a bit of oil and butter, seasonings, add the heart and brown. Add the flour to make a roux and then the kidneys and milk. Cook until thickened and pour into pie crusts. Bake for about 30 minutes and then let set for 20 minutes (or more). Serve with tatties and neeps (boiled potatoes and turnips). Makes 2 pies.

Yellow dock pie crust:

- ֍ 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- \$\frac{4}{2} c dried yellow dock leaves*, crumbled
- ֍ 3/4 teaspoon salt
- \$ 2 sticks chilled unsalted butter, cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- § 6 tablespoons (about) ice water

Mix together the butter and the dry ingredients until it looks like cornmeal, add the water until it forms a loose ball. Let set in refrigerator for about an hour. Bring to room temperature and roll out to about ¼-inch and about 12" in diameter. Place in pie pan, dock and crimp. I also blind bake for about 10 minutes before filling. The dough/crust will be yellow with green flecks.

* Yellow Dock/Curly Dock (Rumex crispus) is a wild green related to sorrel. It is also used as a dye plant (yellow-green) and a medicinal herb. The flavor is akin of a mild collard green.

Public Service Announcement - Service Animals...

This was brought on after a conversation with my brother. There has been an increase of service animals, especially in the SCA; as many people are seeing the worth of these animals to assist in anything from alerting for seizures and low blood glucose to anxiety and other psychological episodes, like those associated with PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder), as well as the traditional seeing-eye, hearing assist, and mobility assist dogs. With this increase comes the need for a guide in understanding the proper manners when around a service animal. Service animals are identified by a vest and or harness stating that they are a service animal. Most commonly, they are dogs; but I have seen horses (miniature), goats, and cats called into service as well.

Now, service animals go through a long training process, first with a trainer, then with their handler and though the animal is trained to focus on their handler, no animal is 100% "bulletproof". ("Bulletproof" means, not phased or distracted by the environment – MH) So,

RULE ONE - Don't Distract The Animal

Distracting the animal could be dangerous for the handler, the animal, even everyone in that area; especially in the case of a psychological episode or a seizure.

RULE TWO - If the vest is on, the animal is "at work".

As mentioned above, a service animal wears a vest or harness denoting its status as a service animal. The vest is part of that training, it tells the animal that it is time to be especially attentive.

RULE THREE - ALWAYS address the handler before approaching the animal.

The handler will determine if it appropriate to pet, address, give water, etc. to the animal.

RULE FOUR - Approach calmly - do not suddenly rush up, yell, or otherwise startle the handler.

The animal may take it for an attack.

I am proud to say that I have heard very few incidents regarding service animal courtesy in Nottinghill Coill. I can trust that my Barony will take this to heart and help others to the same mindfulness so we can all enjoy the event. Parents: please instruct your youngsters in this - this is especially important for them to learn, and it could save a life.

Anyone who has a service animal is free to add to this. To be exact, I would encourage those with service animals to teach a class at an event to raise awareness.

What is something you don't mind sharing that people may not know about you? I love seeing the eyes of someone I did a scroll for when they first see it. It makes me happy to give them joy.


